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Panama's Canopy Tower & El Valle's Canopy Lodge January 4-16, 2025 Tour

Myriads of magazine articles have touted Panama's incredible Canopy Tower, a former U.S. military radar tower transformed by Raúl Arias de Para when the U.S. relinquished control of the Panama Canal Zone. It sits atop 900-foot Semaphore Hill overlooking Soberania National Park. While rooms are rather spartan, the food is excellent and the opportunity to view birds at dawn from the 360° rooftop Observation Deck above the treetops is outstanding.

Twenty minutes away is the start of the famous Pipeline Road, possibly one of the best birding roads in Central and South America. From our base, daily birding outings are made to various locations in Central Panama, which vary from the primary forest around the tower, to huge mudflats near Panama City and, finally, to cool Cerro Azul and Cerro Jefe forest.

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An enticing example of what awaits visitors to this marvelous birding paradise can be found in excerpts taken from the journal I write every night during the tour and e-mail to participants, my family, and some birder friends. This report is created from those journals.

Being on the Observation Deck of the Canopy Tower before sunrise is one of the best parts of this combined Canopy Tower and Canopy Lodge tour. Watching the sun rise over distant Panama City,

listening to the Mantled Howler Monkeys announcing their presence and their territories, and hearing Mottled and Spectacled owls and Collared Forest-Falcons calling are just some of the highlights. This year I heard a Great Potoo - my first ever from the Tower.

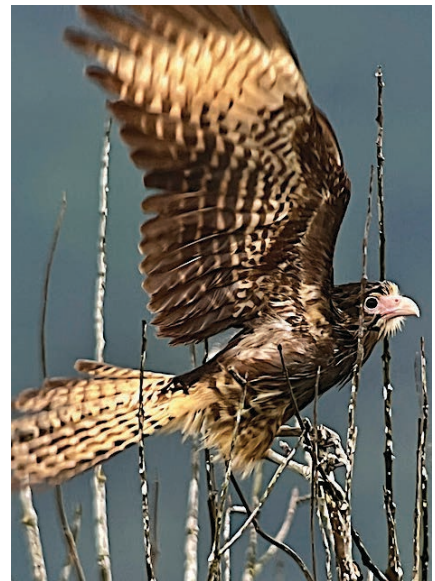
From the deck this morning we observed a male Gartered Trogon, several Geoffroy's Tamarins coming to eat bananas, a juvenile Yellow-headed Caracara, Red-lored & Mealy amazons in flight,

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both male and female Blue Dacnises, Tropical Kingbird, Lesser Greenlet, Green Shrike-Vireo, Brown-capped Tyrannulet, Palm and Blue-gray tanagers, Bay-breasted Warblers, Black and Turkey vultures, Pale-vented Pigeons, and a loafing Green Iguana.

After birding from the observation deck on our first morning, we enjoyed a wonderful buffet breakfast whose enticing aromas had been drifting up to us from the kitchen for about an hour. While waiting to depart on a walk down Semaphore Hill, we observed the hummingbird feeders at the base of the tower. Up to six species were seen, including White-necked Jacobin, Long-billed and Stripe-throated hermits, and Snowy-bellied, Blue-chested, and Violet-bellied hummingbirds.

Next, we walked down the paved Semaphore Hill Road. On this walk we added Velvety Manakin,

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Black-crowned Antshrike, White-whiskered Puffbird, Crimson-crested Woodpecker, Masked Tityra, and more. We also enjoyed the White-nosed Coatis, but the biggest surprise of the morning was the huge Boa Constrictor right next to the road! It was about 7-9 feet long and about 6 inches thick in the middle.

Evening meals are often interrupted by the arrival of various mammal species including Allen's Olingo, Kinkajou, and Panamanian Night Monkeys. During the day, it's fun to watch the Geoffroy's Tamarins and the Green Iguanas. I had the surprise of being greeted by a Kinkajou one morning as I planned to help myself to a cup of coffee, but the next morning after I showed everyone the photos, the entrance hole used was plugged.

We had one of the best mornings ever at Ammo Dump Pond. The highlight for me was the Least Bittern – only seen once in the previous 27 tours.

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However, the most fun was the Yellow-tailed Oriole that gave us close looks from every possible angle and was only about 15 yards away. Of course, the main reason for stopping is the hope that Carlos can call in a White-throated Crake. We heard at least 8 of them and, true to form, Carlos provided bits and pieces of views for us. There were also two juvenile Rufescent Tiger-Herons, providing the participants with a great visual for the reason they are called Tiger-Herons. Only the adult has the rufescent neck and part of the body.

At the intersection before Pipeline Road, Carlos called in a Whooping Motmot, and this location also gave us great views of Cinnamon Woodpecker, male and female Gartered Trogons, Red-throated Ant-Tanager, Fasciated Antshrike, Cocoa Woodcreeper, and Gray-headed Tanager.

We did not stop until we reached the entrance to Discovery Center and here used the bathrooms. Finally arriving at the locked gated entrance to Pipeline Road, it began to rain so we headed back to the Canopy Tower.

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We spent the afternoon at Raúl's B&B in Gamboa. The minute Carlos started placing bananas on the feeders, the tanagers began to flock in to feed. Palm and Blue-gray tanagers were first.

Soon there were Plain-colored and Crimson-backed tanagers joining them. Huge Gray-headed Chachalacas joined the mob and as usual ate most of the bananas, forcing Carlos to go out and replenish the trays. The incredibly beautiful male Red-legged Honeycreepers also put on a show.

Central American Agoutis ate any bananas that fell on the ground and the single nectar feeder was constantly visited by Rufous-tailed Hummingbirds. We had better views here of Whooping Motmot and were also able to add Rufous Motmot. All gasped when the Rufous Motmot on the feeder grabbed and ate a Plain-colored Tanager!

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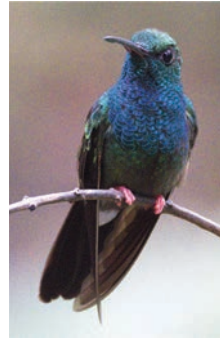
Wind seemed to keep the birds to a minimum when we visited Cerro Azul so we headed to the home of Linda and Jerry Harrison for the hummingbird extravaganza that always awaits us. There were hundreds of birds visiting their hummingbird and banana feeders! Some of the best were Green and Shining honeycreepers, Fulvous-vented Euphonia, Bay-headed and Palm tanagers, Long-billed and Green hermits, Rufous-crested Coquette, Bronze-tailed and White-vented plumeleteers, Crowned Woodnymph, and Violet-capped, Snowy-bellied, Rufous-tailed, and Blue-chested hummingbirds.



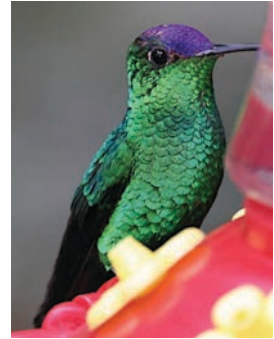

On the drive to the Panama Rainforest Discovery Center, a few of us saw a Common Pauraque fly up from the road. Upon reaching the observation platform, we climbed up the 174 steps to find a distant Blue Cotinga in view. We had excellent looks at the beautiful and colorful Keel-billed Toucan. We also saw another favorite of mine – the Purple-throated Fruitcrow.

In the afternoon, we visited the Gamboa Rainforest Reserve and had a great time seeing some American migrants like Prothonotary, Tennessee, Chestnut-sided, and Bay-breasted warblers, Philadelphia Vireo, and Northern Waterthrush. A Jesus Christ lizard posed nicely.

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On our second attempt at Pipeline Road, we had much better luck. The weather cooperated and so did the birds. Some special finds were White-whiskered and Black-breasted puffbirds, Bicolored Antbird, Yellow-throated Toucan, the tiny Spotted Antbird, male and female Slaty-tailed Trogon, White-tailed Trogon, Rufous Motmot, and Plain-brown Woodcreeper. Small bird flocks included Spot-crowned Antwren, Checker-throated Stipplethroat, Olivaceous Flatbill, and White-flanked Antwren. A roosting Mottled Owl was spotted, too.

An evening spotlight drive on Semaphore Hill Road produced a Great Tinamou roosting in a tree and a Great Potoo.

After breakfast, we headed to Parque Natural Metropolitano – the largest metropolitan park in Central America. One of the highlights for me at this park is the Bradley Crane that was built for scientists to study ecosystems in the upper canopy of huge, very old trees. We could see scientists up in the protective cages that they could maneuver.

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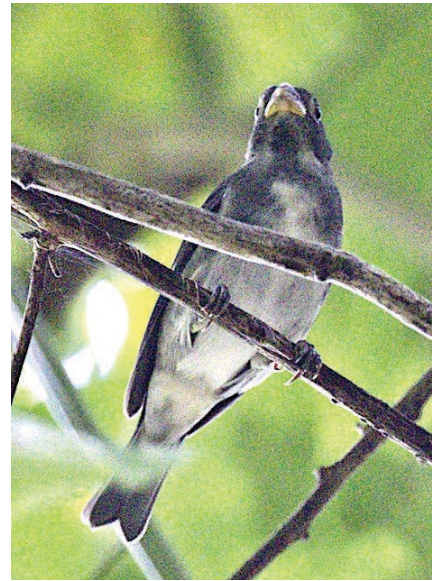
The birding was great, with Orange-chinned Parakeets by the dozens working a fruiting tree and a Rufous-and-white Wren building a nest in an *Acacia* tree. We were able to see lots of species that we had only previously heard or poorly seen, like Lesser Greenlet and Long-billed Gnatwren. Squirrel Cuckoo, male and female Northern Black-throated Trogons, Dusky Antbird, Olivaceous and Cocoa woodcreepers, Plain Xenops, and Lance-tailed Manakin cooperated for photos. By far, the best two birds were White-eyed Vireo (new for me in Panama and fewer than 5 for Carlos) and Slate-colored Seedeater. The latter is seen here only in years when a species of bamboo produces seeds.

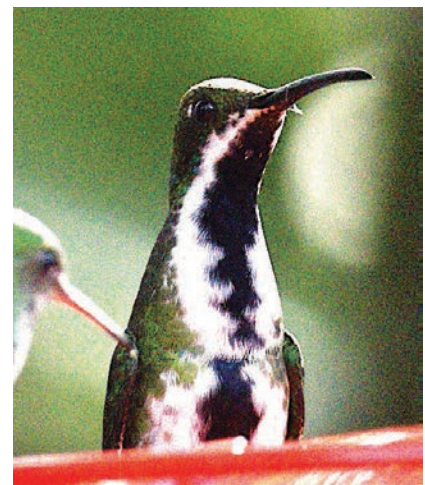
Our final morning at Canopy Tower gave us distant views of a male Blue Cotinga, closer looks at Scaled Pigeon and Red-crowned Woodpecker, and our first looks at Ochre-breasted Flycatcher and a female Black-throated Mango.

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As we headed toward Canopy Lodge, we crossed the Centenario Bridge over the Panama Canal. Arriving in El Valle before lunch, much time was spent looking at the birds and other critters coming in to feast on the fruit and nectar feeders. Among them were Gray-headed Chachalaca, White-tipped Dove, Stripe-throated Hermit, Rufous-crested Coquette, Violet-headed Hummingbird, Gray-cowled Wood-Rail, Collared Araçari, Spot-crowned Barbet, Red-crowned Woodpecker, Blue Dacnis, Thick-billed Euphonia, Chestnut-headed Oropendola, Giant Cowbird,

Social Flycatcher, Bay Wren, Black-chested Jay, Keel-billed Toucan, and Crimson-backed, Blue-gray, Palm, and Bay-headed tanagers. We also enjoyed the good looks at Central American Agouti and two types of squirrels – Variegated and Red-tailed.

All the birds listed above plus dozens of others can be viewed from your home by going to the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology bird cam set up on the large platform feeder. Here is the link [http://cams.allaboutbirds.org/channel/57/Panama Fruit Feeders/](http://cams.allaboutbirds.org/channel/57/Panama_Fruit_Feeders/). One of the most fun events at Canopy Lodge is sitting on the porch watching all the birds and other animals feed.

We were pleasantly surprised when we were joined for dinner by Raúl Arias de Para and his wife, Denise. They are the owners of the Canopy Family properties, whose main home is just down stream from the Canopy Lodge. It is always a treat to visit with them.

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We had an excellent day of seeing very tough-to-get birds and capturing some super photographs on our first visit to Altos del Maria. Our first stop before getting to the entrance to this huge, gated community had a pair of Collared Trogons (formerly Orange-bellied), which allowed us to complete our sweep of all possible trogons on this combo tour.

Other species were Tufted Flycatcher, a female Green Thorntail, Black-and-Yellow Tanagers, Russet Antshrike, Ochraceous Wren, White-ruffed Manakin, Chestnut-capped Warbler, and Tawny-crested, Blue-gray, and Palm tanagers.

There are over one thousand lots in this huge, gated Altos del Maria community, which only has two entrances: the one we were on from El Valle and another from the Pan-American Highway. I would guess that fewer than 20% of the lots have been sold. Within this huge, gated community there is smaller, more elite one called Valle Bonito. Due to the fog today, we headed for that lower area. Two years ago, they built a very nice bathroom, hot tub, pool, and picnic area next to the pond I always visit. We use this area for our picnic lunch.

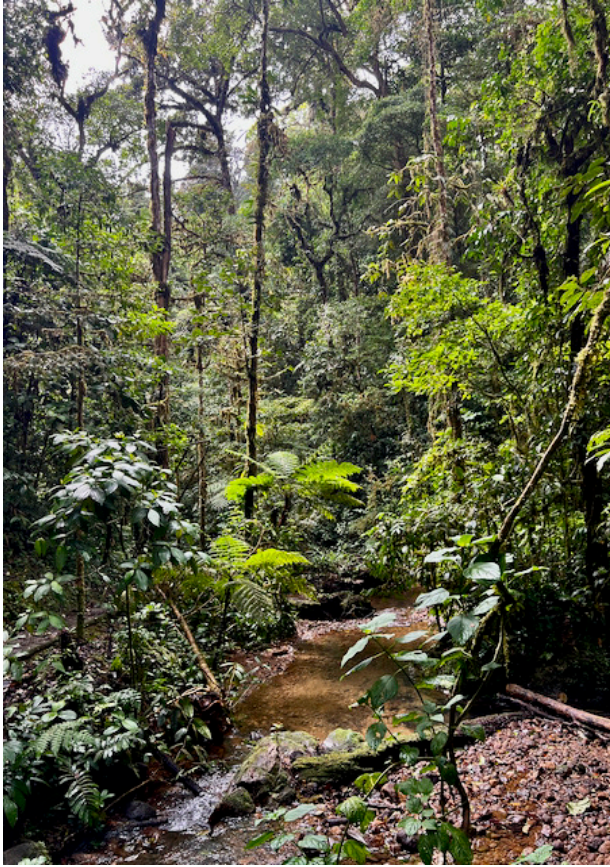

On the day we visited Altos del Maria, Carli and Rachel decided to stay behind and shortly after our departure they identified a Rufous-breasted Hermit and a White-tipped Sicklebill coming to feed in the patch of beautiful Lobster Claw Heliconias. Fortunately, the White-tipped Sicklebill showed up again for some of our group to see when we returned to Canopy Lodge later in the day.

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Beyond the pool in the previous photo there is a large pond with concrete walks all around it, meeting on the far side and following the stream, crossing back and forth over it as one climbs up the canyon. For a ½ mile or so, the concrete path is wide enough for a wheelchair. This is one of my favorite trails in Altos del Maria. Prospective lot buyers are brought here to the new picnic, hot tub, pool area shown above and then to walk the trails in this incredible climax forest.

We always enjoy our picnic lunch here either before or after the hour walk up the trail. Some special birds here today were White-throated Spadebill, Tawny-capped Euphonia, White-flanked Antwren, Green Kingfisher by the pond, and best of all, we were able to call out a Black-eared Quail that scampered across the path right in front of us, but never came back into view.



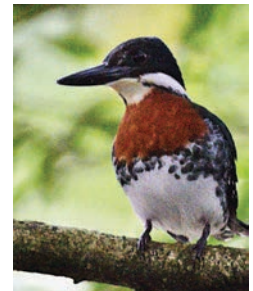

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My favorite climax Neotropical rainforest spot in Panama is called Santiago Aposto. I always give a mini lecture on bryophytes (mosses, liverworts, and hornworts) that cover the large, exposed bank by the parking lot before we climb the steps to the little building. Here where we can appreciate the incredible climax Neotropical rainforest ecosystem, I give a much longer mini lecture that covers photosynthesis vs. respiration and how these two interact to give each plant species its compensation point.

As we returned to Canopy Lodge from Altos del Maria, we stopped at Eric's home to see the wonderful fruit and nectar feeders. His parents put out new bananas, oranges, and rice that immediately began to bring in hungry birds as we sat on the porch watching the show: Flame-rumped, Crimson-backed, Blue-gray, Dusky-faced, and Golden-hooded tanagers, Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, Spot-crowned Barbet, Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer, Thick-billed Euphonias, Clay-colored Thrushes, and Rufous and Lesson's motmots.

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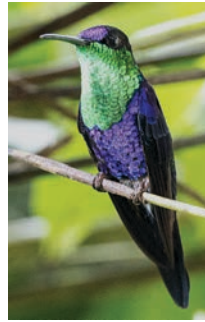
We had a lot of luck on our second visit to Altos del Maria, with several species rarely seen on this tour. A few special hummingbirds were Brown Violetear, Crowned Woodnymph, Purple-crowned Fairy, Green-crowned Brilliant, and a glimpsed White-tailed Emerald.

Other good finds were Northern Emerald-Toucanet, Red-faced Spinetail, Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant, Common Chlorospingus, Black-striped and Orange-billed sparrows, Louisiana Waterthrush, Blackburnian, Chestnut-capped, Buff-rumped and Yellow-rumped warblers, and Hepatic, Tawny-crested, Blue-gray, Flame-rumped, Emerald, and Silver-throated tanagers.

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Because Carlos had to depart yesterday, Eliecer drove our van to the Pacific Coast. The first bird he found for us was a Wedge-tailed Grass-Finch, followed by my closest view of a Crested Bobwhite. Another stop produced two Ferruginous Pygmy-Owls. As we descended to the lowlands, we picked up Striped Cuckoo and two new hummingbirds – Sapphire-throated Hummingbird and Veraguan Mango.

Soaring Wood Storks were a great spectacle and a Fork-tailed Flycatcher was seen, but it did not allow photos. A Bat Falcon soared overhead. Long-legged Savanna Hawks were seen in open fields.

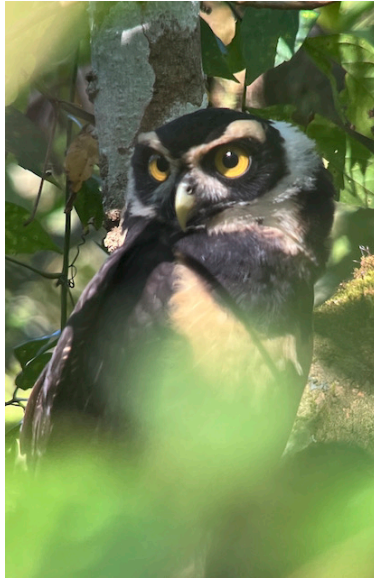
At the beach we saw numerous shorebirds, including Whimbrel, Willet, and Sanderling. We also saw multiple Laughing Gulls as well as Sandwich, Elegant, and Royal terns. Then we headed to Raúl and Denise's beach home in Santa Clara where we swam and ate our picnic lunch.

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Magnificent Frigatebirds put on a real show! A Cocos Booby (recently split from Brown Booby) was the bird I liked most but it was offshore and too far for photos as it swirled around. We checked a spot for Common Potoo, but a noisy party nearby had scared off the adult, leaving its single egg. First time I have seen a potoo egg. This trip to the west coast produced 94 species today!

On our final morning at Canopy Lodge we set out to find several target birds before heading back to Panama City. The first was Tody Motmot. This is the smallest of all motmots found in Panama, the toughest to see, and the last one possible for this tour. After it responded at our first stop, we spent 45 minutes searching for it until Eliecer spotted it in deep cover. Heaven only knows how he did this! Next we headed for a place in El Valle that has many acres of second growth forest and some tall trees to look for Spectacled Owl. Our third trail produced one that Eliecer spotted in a tangle of dead branches. Our last search was for a Tropical Screech-Owl and Eliecer came through again – finding both a gray phase and a tan phase owl perched next to each other. It was an incredible morning of getting target birds and a wonderful ending to our tour.

This **Field List** was prepared for potential participants in **PANAMA'S CANOPY TOWER & EL VALLE TOUR** led by Jeri Langham and local co-leaders Carlos Bethancourt and Danilo Rodriguez. For your convenience, the orders of families and common names are those in the October 2024 eBird / Clements checklist. I have put additional comments of interest such as splits or name changes in parentheses.

- **COLUMN I** is designed to give you a **realistic** idea of which species you are likely to encounter. The numerals in this column indicate the number of 27 previous **CANOPY TOWER VENT** tours that recorded each species. A blank indicates it has not been recorded. When a comma separates two numerals (e.g. 4,1), the first represents the number of tours in which the species was seen, and the second represents the number of times the bird was only heard during the tour. An "h" indicates a species has only been heard and thus never seen on any of these previous trips. However, this was only my 19th tour to visit **El Valle's CANOPY LODGE**, so for species that are only possible there, Column I is not as accurate.
- **COLUMN II** shows the species seen (x) or only heard (h) on the 2025 tour. Species marked with a "J" were seen only by the tour leader(s).

My one or two local co-leaders and I will do our best to show each of you as many species as we can during our short visit to Panama. Just wait until you see the location of the Canopy Tower with its 360° forest canopy top view from the observation deck and the plush accommodations at El Valle with incredible birds coming to the fruit feeder that can be seen on the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology video cam.
